Harding residents' commitment to our open spaces have made the goal of preserving the original intent to restore Glen Alpin and give the public some use of the mansion an achievable goal. With the full support of the Township Committee and overwhelming public support we have been able to methodically work through this challenging process in a transparent, collegial way that will provide tremendous benefit to the community.

Tim has also been a leading voice in stewarding the Township through the challenging Affordable Housing settlement that was reached after several years of negotiation with the Fair Share housing Center. This intricate plan brought Harding's "obligation" down by more than 100 units. Our community is very small and those are the communities that have been targeted for an expansion of "affordable housing" throughout New Jersey. The settlement reached with the Fair Share Housing Center, while onerous, puts no direct financial obligation on the taxpayers of Harding.
